Bernard Mersier

Michael & Earl

- Arc: Villains with depth—Michael's charm masks his monstrosity, while Earl's remorse feels hollow.
- Casting: Actors who can humanize their flaws without excusing their actions.

6. Budget & Logistics

Set & Props

- **Minimalist Approach:** Focus on **symbolic props** (diary, boxing gloves, gun) and **versatile set pieces** (e.g., a single bed frame that doubles as Tiffany's and Bernard's rooms).
- Cost-Effective: Can be produced on a modest budget with creative lighting and sound design.

Rehearsal Focus

- Fight Choreography: Essential for Bernard vs. Michael and school confrontation scenes.
- **Emotional Preparation:** Work with actors on **trauma-informed performance** to ensure authenticity without retraumatization.

- Talkbacks: Invite domestic violence survivors, therapists, or advocates to lead discussions.
